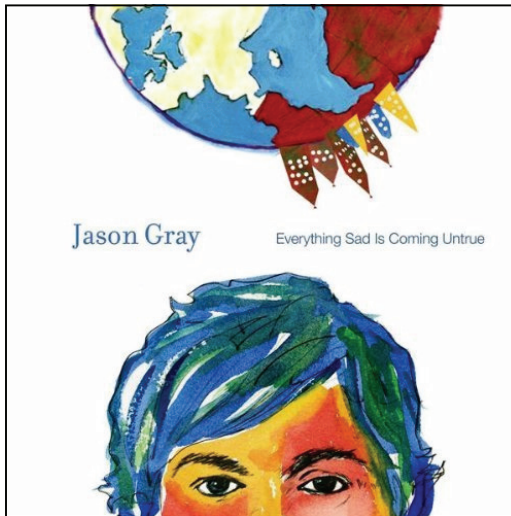

new transmitter projects for those areas.

New Transmitters Coming to Pierre and Dickinson

Through an application process, KSLT has acquired licenses to broadcast in Pierre, SD and Dickinson, ND on new frequencies with considerably more power than the old/current translators. This will allow KSLT to broadcast specific area-related announcements through Pierre and Dickinson's own feeds. When each of these new transmitters are built, the reach of the stations will include many other communities. Close to 20,000 people will have the ability to tune in.

Pierre - When built, this new frequency will be called KSLP. The signal will grow from 40 watts to 2000 watts. Listeners will tune into KSLP at 90.3 FM. In addition, the new coverage will include about a sixty mile stretch of I-90.

Dickinson - When built, this new frequency will be called KSLS. The signal will grow from 135 watts to 2000 watts. Listeners will tune into KSLS at 90.9 FM. When this project is complete, KSLT's current translator in Dickinson will begin broadcasting The Point, our station which is more geared toward youth and young adults.

Tidbit from Tanya

The materials (concrete blocks, sheet metal, etc) that will be available for purchase during the 28 Hours of Mercy will be used to build classrooms as well as restroom facilities with running water at projects in Kenya. Currently, the kids are meeting in mud walled buildings with no roofs. Their restrooms are holes in the ground with two pieces of wood separating them for “semi-privacy.” As we get ready to host the 28 Hours of Mercy and prepare to send our mission team off to Kenya, I want to pose the question, what’s in a concrete block? Initially one might say sand and gravel. I can say from my personal experience in the Dominican Republic that there is a lot more than that in a concrete block. A couple of the obvious things would be shelter and a safe place for the kids to come together. But these blocks are made up of so much more. In them is the labor & love of the teams that build with them. The ways that the team member’s hearts, minds, and lives are forever changed on a trip remain in them. The local’s memories of a group of Americans coming to build and make a difference are in them. These blocks hold the sounds of laughter, songs of praise, hopes and dreams. Most of all, these blocks contain the love of Christ who is our sure foundation. The foundation that these children can build upon as they grow and hope for their future.
